



# The Interfaith Network - A Brief History

The origins of the Interfaith Network (IFN) of the City of Greater Dandenong can be traced back to 1988, when the then City of Springvale embarked upon a two-year Access and Equity Project to develop a community relations strategy that would strengthen social cohesion and promote harmony among the city's diverse communities.

This initiative led to the first meeting of Faith Communities of Springvale on 10 May 1989. From this meeting, the Common Statement was drafted a declaration of unity, respect, and cooperation between different faiths.

On 21 August 1989, the first Annual Gathering of Faith Communities was held at the Springvale Supper Room. At this event, Faith Leaders formally signed the Common Statement, which was then presented to the Mayor, Cr Noelle Trembath. This historic event marked the official beginning of the Interfaith Network.

Since then, the annual signing of the Common Statement has become a tradition, symbolising an enduring partnership between the faith communities, the City of Greater Dandenong, and the wider community.

Today, the Interfaith Network is recognised as Australia's first and oldest interfaith network, and remains a model of collaboration and dialogue. What began as a local initiative has grown into a dynamic and evolving movement, fostering understanding, respect, and peace within one of the country's most diverse municipalities.

# Organisational Reports and Strategic Directions



# IFN Governance

The past 12 months have delivered significant improvements to our corporate governance, strengthening our Executive Committee effectiveness, enhancing accountability and transparency and fostering a culture of unity and optimism for the future of the Interfaith Network.

# Governance highlights for the 2024-2025 financial year included:

- Creation of an ambitious and bold two year strategic plan with objectives and accompanying deliverables.
- Renewal of Governance position descriptions.
- Renewal of Governance policies and procedures including the introduction of a Governance Induction and Orientation program.
- · Regular Governance meetings.
- Ensuring that our signature event, the annual signing of the Common Statement occurs in collaboration with our Faith Leaders, the City of Greater Dandenong and the wider community.
- An intentional lens to broaden our collaboration and partnership efforts to include community services
  organisations, engagement with elected officials, state-wide organisations as well as other Interfaith
  Networks.
- Signature to key community campaigns including the 'Back Your Neighbour Campaign'.
- In consultation with the IFN Membership base a review and renewal of our organisational values in support of our vision
- Constitutional change at our Annual General Meeting in September 2024, which paved the way to
  secure Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status. In May 2025, IFN was advised by the Australian Taxation
  Office, that our application for DGR status had been approved. This achievement is a significant
  milestone for IFN, and much thanks is expressed to the team at Sparke Helmore Lawyers (Sydney) for
  their unwavering support, commitment and pro bono services provided.
- In collaboration with the IFN staffing group, actively participated and contributed to the City of Greater Dandenong's funding review in late 2024, early 2025.

# IFN Operations

The Interfaith Network is staffed by a highly committed and professional team working closely in collaboration with the IFN Executive Committee to deliver the organisation strategic plan.

# Operations highlights for the 2024-2025 financial year included:

- Reset of the extraordinarily successful IFN Places of Worship Tours initiative including the introduction
  of an 'end to end' on-line booking system making for a much more accessible, information and userfriendly system. During the 2024-2025 period, participants, in total, visited 51 Places of Worship
  communities.
- Re-introduction of regular IFN Members meetings which provided an opportunity for Members to connect with one another, engage with the IFN Executive Committee and Staffing Group as well as engage in training and development.
- Mirroring our IFN Membership Application Form, the creation of the IFN Membership and Volunteers
   Database enabling IFN to streamline our communication with Members and Volunteers as well as
   maintain current and accurate Membership and Volunteer information.
- The offering of an annual calendar of events which are open to both Members and Non-Members, including our Harmony Week event, the Annual Signing of the Common Statement. Whilst the annual Interfaith Schools Gathering is not open to the public, over 400 students, teachers, Faith Leaders, IFN members, volunteers and staff participated in this phenomenally successful event, filled with music, singing, artwork, and much laughter.
- Continued coordination and offering of the weekly Messages of Hope. Our weekly Messages of Hope
  will continue to be published in the Star Journal Dandenong, and be made available on our website in
  2026. Continued coordination the fortnightly prayer lead and shared by a Faith Leader at the City of
  Greater Dandenong Council meetings.
- The last 12 months has also delivered a fully integrated IT system for the staffing group including the procurement of an external provider to support the team.
- Furthering our connection with IFN Members and the broader City of Greater Dandenong community, the IFN staffing group established and has operationalised a number of external public facing social media platforms, including LinkedIn, Facebook, Instagram and the IFN website.
- The IFN staffing group made several funding applications throughout the 2024-2025 period to support and grow the reach of the organisation across the City of Greater Dandenong.

# Community Education Initiatives and Services

The past year has been both full and rewarding, with many opportunities to engage schools, organisations, and the wider community in interfaith learning and connection. Through events, tours, and online platforms, the Interfaith Network has continued to provide spaces for dialogue, understanding, and the sharing of traditions. The Community Education portfolio has focused strongly on coordinating the Annual Interfaith School Gathering, overseeing the Places of Worship Tours, and strengthening IFN's social media presence to ensure the message of "Many Faiths, One People" continues to reach and inspire.

### **Annual Interfaith School Gathering**

In October 2024, the Gathering brought together more than 400 students, teachers, Faith Leaders, and community members. Each school shared a faith tradition alongside their Faith Leader under the theme "Sharing the Load." The event was vibrant with creativity, music, and interfaith learning, and received wonderful feedback from all involved. Planning is already underway to build on this success in 2025 with fresh ideas to make the Gathering even more engaging and inclusive.

# **Places of Worship Tours**

The Places of Worship Tours remain one of the most significant ways of connecting with the community. Over the past year, we have seen over 2000 participants join our places of worship tours across Greater Dandenong. These tours opened doors for dialogue, built respect across traditions, and provided thousands of participants with meaningful experiences. A highlight was the introduction of the new online booking system, which has made the tours more accessible and easier to manage.

### **Social Media and Communications**

2024–2025 also marked significant growth in digital engagement. Through Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn, IFN shared Messages of Hope, promoted events, and showcased Interfaith's work to a much wider audience. These platforms have become an important part of how the Network connects with the community and invites new audiences into the interfaith story.

This year has been a strong reminder of the importance of creating spaces where people can learn, share, and connect across faiths. From large gatherings of students to smaller tours and online storytelling, each initiative contributes to the vision of "Many Faiths, One People." Gratitude is extended to Faith Leaders, members, volunteers, and staff who supported these efforts, ensuring the continued growth of interfaith understanding in Greater Dandenong.

# Membership Services

# Weekly Messages of Hope

The Weekly Messages of Hope encourages IFN members and non-members to share words of encouragement and inspiration and hope week after week is truly a wonderful community effort. For the 2024-2025, 45 Messages of Hope were published in the Dandenong Star Journal. The 'messages' are also updated onto the IFN and the Interfaith Network website. Much thanks is given to all those who prepared and shared a 'Message of Hope' and to the Star Journal for their ongoing commitment and support.

## **City of Greater Dandenong Council Council Prayers**

A long-standing tradition to our elected members of Council is the weekly prayers, reflections offered by our IFN members. At the commencement of each City of Greater Dandenong Council Meeting a Faith Leader or Representative within our community offer their blessings on the Councillors, their deliberations and our community.

# **IFN Membership and Volunteers Database**

A major development and achievement for IFN in the 2024-2025 reporting period was the creation of the IFN Membership and Volunteers Database. Mirroring the respective application forms, the database ensures currency and accuracy of member and volunteer information.

### **IFN E-News**

The IFN staffing group is highly committed to ensuring impactful and regular communication with members, partners and the wider City of Greater Dandenong community. The introduction of the monthly IFN E-News in early 2025 further supports our commitment. Subscription is free, and is growing, and we welcome new subscribers!

### **IFN Events**

Supporting the various events throughout the year has been a joy and welcoming new faces to our events.

# Strategic Directions 2025 -2027

In June 2025, the City of Greater Dandenong announced a 4-year funding agreement with the Interfaith Network (July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2025 – June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2029). With this decision, the IFN Executive Committee and Staffing Group embarked upon a review of our organisational strategic plan and a renewed 2 year strategic plan for the 2025-2027 reporting period was established. 

# Programs and Highlights



# Annual Interfaith School Gathering 2024

The Annual Interfaith School Gathering, which began in 2002 and continues today, brings together students, teachers, Faith Leaders, and community members to celebrate interfaith understanding and cultural diversity in Greater Dandenong. Held on 22 October 2024 at Springvale City Hall, the event embraced the UN theme "Sharing the Load," highlighting unity and collective responsibility.

Students from nine schools represented ten faiths: Baha'i faith, Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Sikhism, Taoism, the Sathya Sai Organisation, and Brahma Kumaris. The schools presenting creative performances in drama, music, art, and choirs, guided by teachers and local Faith Leaders. Special contributions from Uncle Dave Dryden, Deputy Mayor Richard Lim OAM, and other community leaders enriched the gathering.

With over 370 students participating alongside Faith Leaders, staff, and volunteers, the event fostered dialogue, respect, and understanding across cultures. Plans for 2025 include deeper student involvement, more interaction with Faith Leaders, and initiatives to celebrate cultural diversity even further.

The 2024 Gathering was also an important learning opportunity, offering students the chance to experience faith traditions outside of their own and to reflect on the values of cooperation and mutual respect. Feedback from schools highlighted the positive impact on students' perspectives, with many continuing discussions on inclusivity and harmony in their classrooms. The event further strengthened the relationship between schools, community leaders, and the Interfaith Network, underscoring the role of young people in shaping a more connected and compassionate future.

# Places of Worship Tours 2024 - 2025

The Interfaith Network's Places of Worship Tours, established in 1991, continue to provide opportunities for dialogue, learning, and connection across Greater Dandenong. In 2024–2025, more than 1,300 people participated in the tours, reflecting its ongoing relevance and impact.

There are three categories of tours; public tours held quarterly, school tours for both primary and secondary students, and specialised tours developed for organisations and groups with particular needs. Collectively, these tours provide access to more than 40 places of worship across ten faiths and religions represented in Greater Dandenong: Buddhism, Christianity, Islam, Judaism, Taoism, Brahma Kumaris, Hinduism, the Bahá'í Faith, the Sathya Sai Organisation, and Sikhism.

This year, tours have been undertaken by a wide range of participants, including staff professional development days for teachers, members of Victoria Police and the Australian Federal Police, staff from the City of Greater Dandenong including the Chief Executive Officer and leadership team, as well as numerous schools and community organisations.

The program is delivered in close collaboration with local faith leaders, whose ongoing support ensures that participants experience authentic insights into diverse faith traditions. These tours continue to play a significant role in strengthening understanding and respect across the community.

# Harmony Week 2025

Harmony Week, celebrated nationally from 17–23 March, is a time to recognise Australia's cultural diversity and to promote inclusiveness, respect, and belonging for all. The week also includes the United Nations International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination on 21 March.

The Interfaith Network marked this occasion with an annual Harmony event on 20 March 2025, bringing together over 40 participants from across the community. Attendees included elected officials from the City of Greater Dandenong, community service providers, other Interfaith Networks, representatives from the Australian Federal Police, IFN Faith Leaders, and members.

The program began with a Welcome to Country by Uncle Mark Brown, followed by an official welcome from Deputy Mayor Sophie Tan. Keynote speaker Jana Favero, Deputy CEO of the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre, delivered an inspiring and optimistic address, encouraging communities to continue building connections and conversations that foster inclusion. A dynamic panel discussion followed, with speakers sharing their perspectives on advocacy, social justice, and the importance of communities working together to achieve positive social outcomes.

The event concluded with closing remarks from IFN President, Mehtap Williams, who expressed gratitude to all attendees for their support and ongoing commitment to making Greater Dandenong a welcoming and compassionate community.

Participants left with a renewed sense of hope and determination to keep championing diversity in their daily lives. The Interfaith Network looks forward to continuing these conversations and building on the momentum of Harmony Week throughout the year.

# 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies


